Commission Revises Mandatory Phone Book Distribution

- *Mandatory directory distribution no longer required
- *Eighteen communities affected
- *Rule in effect since 1976
- *Customer may request a directory

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The Commission April 20 by a 4-1 vote adopted changes to Commission rules in response to a request from AT&T Georgia that will eliminate mandatory distribution of printed directories to 18 Georgia communities with populations over 50,000. Commission rules currently require telecommunications companies to print and distribute residential telephone directories, commonly known as "white pages." Under the amended rule, for communities with combined populations of greater than 50,000, local carriers will not be obligated to distribute printed residential directories. However, **upon a customer's request**, the local exchange carrier is still required to provide the residential directory free of charge in printed or electronic form. Mandatory directory distribution remains an obligation for those local carriers.

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Legislature Finishes Session, Commission Bill Passes

Georgia lawmakers adjourned the 2010 regular session of the General Assembly on April 29, ending the longest running General Assembly since 1889. They approved the 2011 Budget on the final day of the session, a budget that is about \$4 billion less than the FY 2009 budget passed just over two years ago. For the Commission, it was a successful session as House Bill 1233 passed both chambers and is awaiting Governor Sonny Perdue's signature. From all indications, the Governor will sign the measure. AS usual there was other legislation affecting the Commission. Senate Bill 415 won approval on the final day of the session and will give the Commission regulatory authority over emergency point to multi-point warning systems. This is a new area of regulation for the Commission.

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Legislative News

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Lawmakers also approved House Bill 396 which requires the Commission to distribute information packets regarding the laws on the distribution and possession of alcoholic beverages by underage persons to applicants for limousine certification.

Lawmakers accomplished their only mandated job, that of passing a balance state budget, on the final day. Each chamber approved the conference committee report on House Bill 948, which sets state spending for the 2011 fiscal year which begins July 1, 2010 and ends June 30, 2011.



The spending plan calls for spending \$17.8 billion in state funds, which is nearly \$4 billion less than the state budget passed just two years ago.

For the Commission, the budget is about \$1.2 million less than our 2009 spending levels. Our authorized budget is set at just over \$9.1 million including federal funds.

This was the last legislative session for a large number of statewide elected officials and legislators including Governor Sonny Perdue who can not seek re-election, and House Majority Leader Jerry Keen who is not seeking re-election. Representative John Lunsford who carried our legislation, H.B. 1233, has also decided to retire from the legislative arena.

Two lawmakers have left the legislature to seek the PSC seat being vacated by Commissioner Robert Baker. Senator John Douglas of Conyers and Representative Jeff May of Monroe have qualified for the July 20 Republican primary. A runoff would be held on August 10.

Atlanta Gas Light Files Rate Increase Request

The Commission is reviewing the Atlanta Gas Light Company (AGLC) request for an increase in its base rates filed with the Commission on May 3. Following three rounds of hearings beginning in August of this year, the Commission will issue a decision on the request in November 2010.

According to the Company's filing they are seeking an annual increase of \$54.1 million in

revenues or about a \$3.00 per month increase in the monthly base charge for the average residential customer in the AGLC delivery area. The Company is also seeking an increase in its return on equity (ROE) from 10.90% to 11.25%. The Commission decided the last AGLC rate case on June 10, 2005 at which time the Commission froze the Company's base rates until April 30, 2010. The rate case is under Docket 31647.

Commission Joins Governor to Proclaim April Dig Safely Month

Georgia Governor Sonny Perdue on April 1 proclaimed April 2010 as Dig Safely Month in Georgia. During a ceremony at the State Capitol, Governor Perdue presented a proclamation to representatives of the Commission, Georgia 811, Georgia Utility Contractors Association, Georgia Power, Atlanta Gas Light, AT&T and other organizations involved in the prevention of damage to Georgia's underground utility infrastructure. The Commission is charged with the enforcement of the state's underground utilities damage prevention programs. The Commission's program is rated one



of the top five in the nation and serves as a model for other states to follow in reducing damages to underground utilities. The Commission works to educate excavators and utilities in order to avoid accidents that can cause expensive and often dan-

gerous damage to buried utilities. **Commission Chairman Lauren "Bubba" McDonald, Jr.** said, "We are joining the Governor and all interested groups in working collectively toward a common goal to prevent damages and personal injuries from occurring to the state's underground utility facilities. In addition, we work to prevent the interruption of utility service as well. Since the passage of the Georgia Utility Facility Protection Act in 2000, the state has built a damage prevention program second to none" *(Continued on page 5)*



Commission Approves Van Service

The Commission April 6 granted emergency authority to a Clayton County passenger van carrier who will provide transportation service to residents of Clayton County. The Commission approved a Class B Passenger Certificate Temporary Emergency Authority for Bisola Ige, doing business as South-

side Transportation (Southside). Commission Reduces Atmos Energy Rate Increase

The Commission on March 29 voted 4 to 1 to reduce the Atmos Energy request for an increase in its base rates. The Commission decision lowers the Company's requested increase in revenue by approximately \$800,000 per year. The Company filed a request on October 1, 2009 for a \$3.8 million annual increase in its base rates. Other terms of the decision in-

clude:

- Increases residential customer monthly bill by approximately \$3.
- Increases the Company's revenue by \$3 million annually.
- Places new rates in effect on April 1, 2010
- Sets the Company's rate of return on equity at 10.7%

The Commission held three rounds of hearings at which the Company, Commission staff, other interested parties, also known as intervenors, and the public were allowed to present testimony and evidence in support of their positions in this case. The Commis-

sion heard from 14 witnesses during the hearings. The Commission also held a public comment meeting in Gainesville and heard from a number of public speakers.

The Commission last approved an increase in Atmos Energy's base rates in 2008.

Atmos Energy serves approximately 57,000 customers in Columbus and Gainesville, Georgia.



Commission Issues Decision in Georgia Power Fuel Cost Recovery Case

The Commission on March 17 approved a settlement in the Georgia Power Company request for an increase in the Company's fuel cost recovery rates. The decision means a lower increase in the monthly fuel rate, as well as other mechanisms to keep future fuel costs in check.

Consumers will see a lower fuel rate than originally proposed by the Company. Georgia Power customers using an average of 1000 kilowatt hours a month will see an increase

of \$5.59 in their bills beginning April 1, 2010.

The agreement contains a number of items that will benefit consumers. By collecting the under collected balance of fuel costs, fuel that Georgia Power has already purchased, over a 42-month period beginning April 1, the



Company will be able to take advantage of lower interest costs and lower fuel costs to bring the balance down to zero as quickly as possible. The current under collection balance is now \$683 million. The Commission approved the 42-month collection period on a motion by **Commissioner Doug Everett**. The agreement establishes a mechanism to keep future under

collected balances from reaching the huge balances which have accumulated in the past. The Interim Fuel Rate (IFR) will allow the Company to increase the fuel rate should the under collected balance reach more than \$75 million of the projected fuel budget. However the IFR can not exceed 10 percent of the current fuel rate and may not be adjusted more than three times in one year. Any

increases in fuel rates through the IFR are subject to Staff review and Commission approval. A request for an increase in the fuel cost is not the same as a request for an increase in base rates. Georgia law allows electric utilities to recover their fuel costs, prudently incurred, on a dollar for dollar basis (O.C.G.A. 46-2-26). The utilities are not

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in the nation.” Chairman McDonald added, “For those states who do not currently have a damage prevention program, I would issue a challenge to follow Georgia’s lead and begin such a program, it is the right thing to do.” This “one call” system is free to contractors and excavators as well as homeowners and helps all excavators comply with the law.



Commission Begins Hearings on Georgia Power Integrated Resource Plan

The Commission April 13 started its triennial review of the Georgia Power Company 2010 Integrated Resource Plan (IRP).

This review is required by law and is the utility’s long-range plans for and forecasts of the



state’s electric power needs for the next three years.

Additional hearings are scheduled for May 18-19, 2010 and June 10-11, 2010.

The Commission is scheduled to issue a decision on the Georgia Power IRP at its regular Administrative Session on July 6, 2010.

allowed to make a profit on their fuel costs. The Commission can also, on its own request, require a utility to file a fuel cost docket.

Georgia law also requires the Commission to issue a decision on the Company’s request within 90 days of the Company’s filing. Otherwise, the

Company’s request goes into effect. The statutory deadline for this docket was March 15, 2010. The Commission held a full day of hearings this year on February 22 at which the Company, Commission staff, other interested parties, also known as intervenors, and the public were allowed to present testimony and evidence in support of their posi-

tions in this case. There were five intervenors in this docket representing consumers, commercial and industrial customers. The Commission heard from 13 witnesses during the hearing. At the conclusion of the hearings, the Company and the Public Interest Advocacy Staff reached

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New Direct Deposit Policy

In an effort to maximize the utilization of electronic payments and to minimize the number of paper checks issued by the State, the State Accounting Office (SAO) has issued a new policy on payroll direct deposit.

Please be aware that this policy applies to all employees paid by the PeopleSoft HCM central payroll system administered by the State Accounting Office therefore all PSC employees are affected. A few key points of the new policy are:

- All current and future employees are affected
- Current employees have until June 1, 2010 to enroll.
- An exemption process is avail-

able with several caveats

- Employees that request and receive an exemption from SAO will have paper checks **mailed ON PAYDAY from SAO**

- The new policy contains several pages of 'Frequently asked Questions and Answers' that are very informative

Vogle Monitoring Hearings; Judge Rules in Vogle Lawsuit

The Commission will begin the second set of hearings to review Plant Vogtle Construction costs on May 26 and 27. Under the Commission's order in this Docket 29849, Georgia Power must file semi-annual reports on the progress of the multi-billion dollar construction project.

On April 30, Fulton County Judge Wendy Shoob issued a bench ruling that sent the Plant Vogtle certification case back to the Commission for additional findings of fact.

Commission Authorizes Funds for Natural Gas Assistance

The Commission May 4 unanimously approved the distribution of up to \$500,000 in matching funds from the Universal Service Fund (USF) to the Georgia Department of Human Services (DHS) for the Fresh Start Program. The monies will be used to provide assistance to low income natural gas customers in

the Atlanta Gas Light Company (AGLC) service area to pay their bills and/or deposits.

The Commission's approval of the USF disbursement will enable DHS to apply for federal matching grants under the Fresh Start program which has been established to assist low income natural gas customers in the AGLC

territory. Fresh Start is a federal program that provides one-time crisis assistance payments for needy families. Under the program, 80% of the monies will be federal funds, 10% will be USF funds, 5-10% will be paid by the Natural Gas Marketers and the recipient will

pay 0-5%.

The Commission's decision limits the initial disbursement to DHS to \$100,000 but authorizes up to \$500,000 in disbursements from the USF upon proper showing of need. The Commission's decision requires DHS to submit monthly reports detailing the amount of funds received and how they are spent and stipulates that the

USF funds can only be spent on customers in the AGLC service territory.

The Universal Service Fund is a fund established under the Natural Gas Deregulation Act of 1997. The law authorizes the Commission to order disbursements from the USF to assist low income consumers in times of emergency as determined by the Commission.
