

# **Locations Proposed for New Battery Systems**





Proposed locations for battery systems include:

- A solar facility near Robins Air Force Base in Bibb County
- A solar facility near Moody Air Force Base in Lowndes County
- The retired Plant Hammond facility in Floyd County
- The McGrau Ford site in Cherokee County

Each of the proposed systems will consist of 4-hour duration battery systems and will be available for use by the winter of 2026/27.

Battery systems add to Georgia Power's diverse portfolio of energy generation. Energy stored in the batteries can be deployed during times of peak demand or during hours where intermittent energy generation methods (such as solar) are not producing power.

The PSC will hold hearings on the proposed locations over the next several months and will make a final ruling in December.





## TAX SAVINGS LEAD TO POWER BILL RATE RELIEF



The Georgia Public Service Commission unanimously approved a motion to expedite savings for Georgia Power customers based on recent corporate tax cuts.

About \$122 million in tax cuts realized by Georgia Power will be applied to customers' bills beginning in January.

In the 2022 Rate Case, the PSC directed Georgia Power to pass any savings from tax breaks to rate payers. Then, in April 2024, Gov. Brian Kemp signed a bill that reduced Georgia's corporate income tax rate.

PSC Commissioner Fitz Johnson entered a motion directing Georgia Power to apply the tax relief to customers' bills starting in January. This will expedite savings for Georgia Power customers. Without this motion, the tax savings would not have been applied to power bills until January 2026.

# STUDY COMMITTEE LOOKING INTO WATER REGULATION IN GEORGIA

During the 2024 session of the Georgia General Assembly, a bill was introduced that would give the Georgia Public Service Commission regulatory authority over private water systems.



Although the bill did not pass, a secondary

bill set up a study committee to investigate the issue. PSC Chairman **Jason Shaw** was named as one of the study committee's eight members.

The study committee is expected to discuss how water utilities operate and whether pricing regulation is warranted. If the PSC were given regulatory authority, the study committee will help determine how that regulatory structure will work.

# FORMER COMMISSIONER EVERETT'S PORTRAIT HANGS IN PSC HALL OF HONOR

The Georgia Public Service Commission held a portrait unveiling ceremony for Doug Everett, a former Chairman of the PSC.

Everett served 16 years on the Commission from 2002 through 2018. He was a dedicated public servant for more than 40 years. Prior to his work with the PSC, he served on the Albany City Commission and three terms in the Georgia House of Representatives.

While serving in the PSC, Everett was elected to a stint as president of the Southeastern Association of Regulatory Utility Commissioners. He passed away in 2021. His wife of 61 years, Janice, and family members attended the portrait ceremony.

Everett, who was born in Cordele but spent most of his life in Albany, is

the fourth former PSC Chairman to be honored with a portrait in the Commission's hall. In 2021, former Chairman David Burgess was honored with a portrait unveiling. Burgess was the first African American to serve as a Commissioner. Fulton County Superior Court Judge Chuck Eaton, also a former PSC Chairman, was honored with a portrait in 2023 and former Chairman Stan Wise's portrait was unveiled earlier this year.

#### HOPEWORKS BUDGET TO INCREASE OVER NEXT FOUR YEARS

At a recent meeting of the Public Service Commission, Ms. Pearl Glover thanked the Commission for its support of HopeWorks. Through the program, the retiree said, she received a free hot water heater and furnace. Without assistance from HopeWorks, Ms. Glover would not have been able to afford the much needed appliances.

In 2015, the Georgia Public Service Commission approved a grant for the HopeWorks program through the Atlanta Gas Light Company Universal Service Fund. The program can repair or re-

place gas furnaces or hot water heaters for seniors who own and live in their home and who meet financial restrictions.

At a PSC meeting to renew the petition for the HopeWorks program, Commissioner **Fitz Johnson** made a motion that the PSC increase the disbursement into HopeWorks by 3 percent each year between 2026 and 2029. The motion was approved unanimously.

Just since 2020, HopeWorks has serviced 734 homes of low-income senior citizens by repairing or replacing 984 gas appliances.

### CIVIL ENGINEERS GIVE GEORGIA INFRASTRUCTURE A "C+"

The American Society of Civil Engineers in its annual grading of states on infrastructure gave Georgia a "C+", listing significant areas that need improvement.

Where schools and bridges each received a "B", and Georgia's ports received a "B+", Georgia's overall grade was brought down by a "D" in transit and "C-" grades in stormwater and wastewater infrastructure.

At a press conference to discuss the report, Public Service Commissioner **Tim Echols** said Georgia needs to become more committed to infrastructure improvement.

"This is a wakeup call," he said. "We need to get better."

Georgia's energy infrastructure received a "B". Georgia was specifically recognized for a diverse energy generation mix including nuclear, natural gas, solar, coal, hydro-electric, biomass and petroleum. The report mentioned Georgia's reduction of coal-fired plants coupled with increases in carbon-free solar and nuclear energy. The report included the addition of Vogtle Unit 3 but was completed before Vogtle Unit 4 came online.

Founded in 1889, NARUC is a non-profit organization dedicated to representing state public service commissions who regulate utilities. NARUC's are from all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands.

# FROM HUMAN RESOURCES: TEAMWORKS TO BE REPLACED BY NEXTGEN



For more than 20 years, Georgia state employees have used TeamWorks to access employment data and submit timesheets. The program, which has become difficult and costly to support, will be phased out in favor of a new system called NextGen.

Human Resources Director **Lynn Page** is involved in preparing the human capital management module for the April 2025 changeover. Training will begin in the coming months. Once the new program is online, employees can expect an enhanced user experience through intuitive technology, maximized use of resources and reduced redundancy. One particularly innovative change with NextGen is its cloud-based platform. All transactions are updated in real time rather than requiring overnight processing.

Also included in the NextGen rollout is a major financial and budget component. Chief Financial Officer **Jane Stroeva** is overseeing the that program's conversion, which will come online in October 2025.



Commissioner **Lauren "Bubba" McDonald** spoke to the 2024 class of Leadership Georgia.


